### **Notes from the Director, Dan Boyd**

Every two or three years the South Dakota Braille & Talking Book Library sends a survey out to all of our patrons. There are two reasons for sending you this survey document and asking you to complete the survey and return it to the library.

The first reason for this document is that it is required by the Library of Congress, National Library Service for the Blind & Physically Handicapped (NLS). We take the data from your surveys and provide a report to NLS. This report provides NLS with information on the level of service that we are providing to our patrons. It shows NLS what we are doing well and also where we need to make improvements. The information from our report and from the other NLS libraries is provided in a report to The Librarian of Congress and the members of Congress. This information is then used as documentation for budget requests and other enhancements to the program.

In South Dakota with over 5,000 individuals using the library this is the fastest way for us to get information on the quality of our service. The library takes the information from the survey and uses it to make improvements in our service and at times as supporting documentation during budget hearings.

In the past the only way to complete the survey was to use the paper copy that we sent you in the mail. This survey document is being placed on our Internet site and you can now complete the survey on line. To access the survey go to <http://library.sd.gov/b&tb/> . ## **Books in Series**

Many authors write books in a series. Some series are written in a strict reading order. Others are not. Many times, it is your preference about how you read a series.

The library computer software has a series feature. Each person's library record includes a series preferences section. At your request, your reader advisor will add a specific book series to your preference section. Once a series is listed in your series preferences section, the software will send the books in series order, one title at a time. You do not have to order any additional titles in the series.

Library staff does not automatically add any series to the series preference section. If you receive a book that is part of a series and you wish to receive the series in sequence, please contact us.

## Read This To Me

ReadThisToMe is a free reading service for blind and low-vision people, powered by volunteers and Internet collaboration.

ReadThisToMe allows blind and low-vision people (clients) to have printed documents read to them over the phone. All a person needs is a phone line and a fax machine (no computer is required.) Here's how it works:

1. The client faxes the document to be read to the ReadThisToMe toll-free fax number: 1-877-333-8848. The first page of the fax needs to be a cover page that includes the client's first name and callback (voice) phone number. The document itself can be just about anything: a handwritten letter, a bill, a can of food, a multi-page magazine article -- just about anything that can be faxed.
2. One of ReadThisToMe's volunteer readers will call the client back — usually within an hour — and read the document.
3. That's it!

The service is available throughout the U.S. and Canada and is absolutely free (though donations are gladly accepted).

He covered virtually every foot of the range in western South Dakota and parts of Wyoming, Montana, and Nebraska on horseback, and once knew every important brand in the West.
